Doane University has listed several jobs available for students to apply for the summer.

The university is looking to fill two Haddix Fitness Center Supervisor part-time positions for the summer. Those hired would be responsible for cleaning and maintaining

the weight room and assisting the head strength and conditioning coach. Requirements for these positions include being able to lift at least 45 pounds and having experience with the weight room.

There are five positions available as a Service Center Customer Service Representative. This job would require those hired to assist with technology support either over the phone or at the desk in the Learning Commons. Knowledge of Microsoft Office is preferred for these positions, as well as customer service skills.

Facilities have several positions available for the summer. These positions include Summer Custodial help, Summer Grounds and Landscape Associate and Summer Trades Assistant, which would include assisting

with plumbing, HVAC and electrical work.

Construction Services has two summer positions open for Summer Carpenter and Painter Helper. These positions would entail painting, fixing drywall and other carpentry tasks.

There are three to four positions available to work as a Summer Conference Assistant for Event Services. Those hired would be expected to help with guests on campus including tracking their arrival and departure.

Two positions are available as a Summer Human Resources Student Assistant for Human Resources (HR). HR is looking for students who are highly responsible and interested in Business, HR or a related field.

The Library is looking

for two to four Summer Library Assistants. Students should be capable of pushing loaded book carts and lifting at least 20 pounds.

Edison fire burns 30,000 acres

April 7, strong winds and dry conditions helped facilitate a rural fire near the town of Edison, Neb. that ended up burning over 30,000 acres, around 47 square miles.

An emergency alert was sent out by the Nebraska State Patrol for the immediate evacuation of the 130 residents of Furnas County the night of

April 7. The evacuation order would later be extended to the more rural residents of Furnas County and the nearby town of Stamford in Harlan County once the fire began to grow larger.

According to the National Weather Service, several houses in the area were destroyed due to the flames, as reported by the Washington Post. Several area schools also canceled classes on April 8 in accordance with the order set by the Nebraska State Patrol.

The cause of the fire has been determined to be related to the falling

of a dead tree into a power line along with the 60 mile per hour winds on April 7, then 40 mile per hour winds on April 8 experienced throughout large portions of Nebraska.

By midday on April 8, the fire had reached 30,000 acres burned and had some 40 fire departments respond from the surrounding region along with two Black Hawk helicopters sent from the Nebraska National Guard to drop water on the flames.

The fire was also deemed to be an indirect cause of death of the

Elwood Volunteer Fire Chief Darren Krull.

Upon initially responding to the fire call, it has been cited that the smoke produced from the fire cut visibility to near zero, resulting in the collision of the SUV carrying multiple emergency officials with a water tanker on Highway 283 in Furnas County.

Krull, 54, who was riding passenger in the SUV, was pronounced dead at the scene while the driver, Phelps County Emergency Manager Justin Norris, 40, suffered life-threatening injuries in the crash but was hospi-

talized in stable condition No other deaths or injuries have been reported on April 8. The driver of the water tanker, 28, was uninjured in the crash.

Weekly Nebraska COVID update

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the level of community transmission is low for Saline County.

The Doane COVID-19 Risk Dashboard was last updated on April 7. Doane has reported no current cases of COVID-19.

The cumulative total of COVID-19 cases remains at 100 cases throughout the semester so far.

Doane has broadly lifted their mask mandate as of Feb. 23, meaning that students are able to walk maskless inside buildings on campus.

Faculty can still request students wear masks, but not require them unless they are meeting in personal spaces, such as an office, or students are working in close proximity to each other, such as labs.

Public health areas

such as in the Student Health Office will still require masks to be worn.

The COVID-19 Task Force continues to meet every other week due to the decrease in COVID-19 cases seen throughout Doane communities.

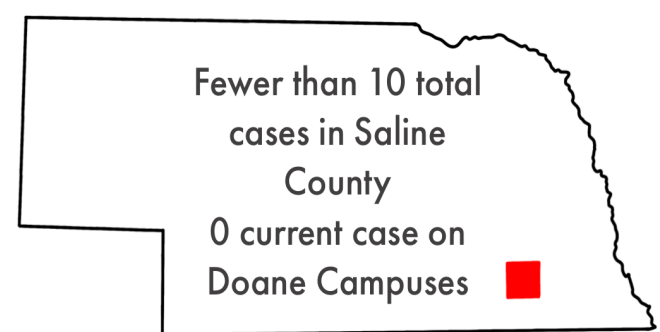
Saline County has reported fewer than 10 total cases of COVID-19 and the case rate per 100,000 residents has been suppressed, as of April 18.

There are 61.3 percent of the Saline County population equal to or over the age of 12 in Saline

County that have been vaccinated, marking 52.9 percent of the total population as vaccinated.

Although there are no current indoor mask mandates for Lincoln-Lancaster county, county residents can still expect to have to wear masks in some facilities, such as hospitals and airports. All forms of public transportation and school buses are still being required to adhere to masking requirements due to federal guidelines.

The CDC notes that people can now go mask-

Russia and Ukraine update

Ukraine claims sinking of Russian warship

The war between Russia and Ukraine continues, with neither side able to make any significant headway against the other.

According to The BBC, pictures and videos of a Russian warship sinking were released on April 14. While Ukrainian forces are claiming that they sunk the "Moskva" with a missile strike, the Russian military asserts that while the ship was being towed in a storm, a fire onboard the vessel caused ammunition to explode, causing the 186m cruiser to sink. There are no signs of a storm in the released images. When The BBC showed the images and videos to multiple naval experts, they all agreed the damage appeared consistent with a missile attack, but they could not come to a joint consensus over whether other causes were still possible. It is believed that all 510 crewmates on the vessel are unharmed.

However, the sinking

of the "Moskva" has not seemed to deter the Russian military from continuing their quest to conquer Ukraine.

According to the Associated Press, Russian forces launched missile attacks on the western city of Lviv and several other targets across Ukraine on April 18. At least seven people have been reportedly killed in the attack, but it is unknown how many were injured. The missile strikes hit three military infrastructure facilities and an auto mechanic shop, according to Maksym Kozzytskyy, the region's governor. A hotel which had been sheltering Ukrainians who had fled from other areas was among the buildings severely damaged.

Lyudmila Turchak, a mother of two who fled from the eastern city of

Kharkiv, feels there is no safe place for her and her family anymore.

"The nightmare of war has caught up with us even in Lviv," Turchak said.

Lviv had only experienced sporadic attacks up to this point, and it had become a haven for civilians fleeing the fighting elsewhere in the country. It had also turned into a major gateway for weapons, supplies and foreign fighters from the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO).

These attacks come as Russia continues building up troops and artillery in the east and the south for the expected start of a new ground offensive. The target is estimated to be Donbas, Ukraine's mostly Russian-speaking industrial heartland.

Kharkiv, Ukraine's

second-largest city, was shelled, causing the deaths of at least three people, one of whom was a woman who appeared to be going out to collect water in the rain. Military analysts say Russia is increasing its strikes on military targets, weapons factories, railways and other infrastructure targets across Ukraine to wear the country down. Donbas is believed to be the next target of this potential offensive, as its capture has been the Kremlin's main goal since it failed to capture Ukraine's capital city Kyiv.

Ukraine has halted civilian evacuations for a second day on April 18, as it states Russia is shelling and blocking the humanitarian corridors for evacuees. Deputy Prime Minister Iryna Veresh-

chuk stated that Ukraine had been negotiating safe passage from cities and towns in eastern and southeastern Ukraine, but Russia was refusing to adhere to keeping those areas free of fighting. The government of the Luhansk region in Donbas said that four civilians were shot and killed by Russian forces while they were trying to flee.

Vereshchuk warned Russia on social media: "Your refusal to open these humanitarian corridors will in the future be a reason to prosecute all involved for war crimes."

However, Russia instead blamed "neo-Nazi nationalists" in Mariupol of hampering the evacuation.

There are no further updates as of this publication.

Opioid deaths in Nebraska

Neb. on DEA list of states facing mass overdoses

As of April 6, the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) has sent

warning of recent fentanyl related mass-overdose events in six states.

According to the DEA, a mass-overdose event is "characterized as three or more overdoses occurring close in time and at the same location."

Within the last few months, around 58 overdoses and 29 deaths have resulted in multiple mass-overdose events that have been observed in Wilton Manors, Fla.; Austin, Texas; Cortez, Colo.; Commerce City, Colo.; Omaha, Neb.; St.

Louis, Mo. and Washington, D.C.

The DEA believes that drug traffickers are increasingly mixing fentanyl with other illicit drugs in order to drive addiction higher and create repeat buyers. The scenarios that are most likely causing these mass-overdose events are either how drug dealers are selling fentanyl (in powder form) saying it's cocaine or mixing it into pills that are nearly identical to regular prescription pills.

Due to this trend,

multiple people are unknowingly ingesting fentanyl in possibly lethal doses.

As of October 2021, the DEA reports that the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) estimated more than 105,000 Americans died of drug overdoses and 66 percent of those are related to synthetic opioids like fentanyl in the 12 months leading up to then.

In comparison, "last year, the United States suffered more fentanyl-related deaths than gun- and auto-related deaths combined," the DEA release read.

In order to assist with

the multiple mass-overdose events, the DEA prepares to offer all available resources to help local law enforcement, including interdicting the substance driving the spike in local overdoses, investigating and identifying potential drug dealers and larger drug trafficking organizations responsible for the event, providing priority access to all DEA resources, assisting with the presentation of the investigation to federal prosecutors and warning the public about the lethal drug threat.

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Ex-GOP staffer sentenced to prison

On April 8, 2022, former GOP staffer Ruben Verastigui was sentenced to 12.5 years of prison by Judge Amit Mehta. The sentencing comes after the D.C. Metropolitan Police Department's Youth and Family Division, Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force and Homeland Security had completed an 11-month long investigation.

Law and Crime reported on April 8, Verastigui pled guilty to possession of 152 videos and over 50 images of child pornography. Throughout the

investigation, it was revealed he had been messaging with a group of 17 other people who were "actively producing" content.

Politico's report on April 8 further reveals more disturbing conversations that will not be detailed, but they revealed Verastigui's desire to cause harm towards children.

Before his arrest, Verastigui worked as the digital media coordinator for Students for Life of America, a pro-life group. He moved on to become a senior digital strategist for the Senate Republican Conference and the Republican National Committee, where he worked

with high ranking Republicans. He left the Republican conference in 2020 to work as the communications manager for Citizens for Sensible Energy Solutions.

The news of Verastigui comes in the middle of the GOP's campaign for the midterm elections. Members of the GOP have yet to release a comment on their former employee but have not hesitated to bring up the issue of pedophiles in the government. Newsweek reported on April 22 that Representative from Georgia Marjorie Taylor Greene has called three Republican Senators "pro-pedophile."

Accusations against

both parties did not end there.

During the hearings to confirm Justice Ketanji Brown Jackson, Donald Trump Jr. tweeted, "when did Democrats become so pro-pedophile? Has it always been so or is it a more recent trend made easier by technology? At any other time in American history the mere defense of these perversions would be far more than disqualifying... now it's not even shameful to them."

The use of fear tactics connected to protecting children has been used since the 2016 election with roots in Pizzagate and has since expanded in elite child sex-traffick-

ing rings."

"It broadens the bad guy beyond those conspiracy theories' cabals of Democratic and Hollywood elites who were said to be engaging in Satanic child sex trafficking and blood guzzling. The predators are now down the street and in schools. It's a revival of the Satanic Panic of the 1980s and 1990s," Los Angeles Times's Jean Guerro wrote on April 7.

The smear campaign is working. According to Vice on April 12, a new poll by YouGov found that half of Republicans say that it is definitely or probably true that "top Democrats are involved in elite child sex-traffick-

ing rings." Protection from pedophiles has been used to justify a variety of recent bills. Most recently, spokesperson for Governor Ron DeSantis of Florida Christina Pushaw argued the "Don't Say Gay" bill was really an "anti-grooming bill" while saying the opposition was "probably a groomer, or at least you don't denounce the grooming of 4-8 year old children."

No members of the Republican party leadership or organization has given a statement on Verastigui's sentencing as of this publication.

Olympic Swim Trials move to Indiana

After hosting the last four Olympic Swim Trials, Omaha will no longer hold the trials, as they have been relocated to Lucas Oil Stadium in Indianapolis, Ind.

Mayor of Indianapolis Joe Hogsett announced the move on March 29. The trials for the 2024 summer Olympics will take place in June.

The Omaha Sports Commission released a statement following the move.

"The Omaha Sports Commission has enjoyed a great relationship with USA Swimming over the past sixteen years, having hosted the last four U.S. Olympic Swim Trials, and we congratulate the city of Indianapolis on their award. While we are disappointed with the news this morning regarding the 2024 Olympic Swim Trials, we are proud of the growth the

Trials experienced while in Omaha." the Commission board said.

This will be the first time Indianapolis has held the trials since 2000 and also the first time the Trials will ever be held in a football stadium. The venue is expected to hold double the capacity of the CHI Health Center in Omaha, with around 30,000 fans being seated.

However, the Trials moving affects more than just fans and Olympic

hopefuls. It also affects local coaches and teams who have the Trials to thank for swimming opportunities.

"Some of these kids are as good as they are right now because we had the Trials. It motivated them. They got to watch it in their hometown. It's a big deal that we had it. It's a big letdown that we don't," Greater Omaha Aquatics Leopard Sharks swim coach Tom Beck said in an interview with

KETV.

In an interview with KMTV, Millard Aquatic Club's coach Katherine Anglin also expressed how much this affects her athletes.

"[The Trials] push you to want to be better, to excel and to become a better swimmer and to aim to be at the trials someday, especially when you're young, and your dreams are big," Anglin said.

The loss of the Trials also significantly affects

local businesses in Omaha as the Trials brought fans from across the country to Omaha.

"In 2016, when we had the record-breaking attendance year, it was worth \$74 million to the local economy, and even in '21 when we held the delayed 2020 Swim Trials, it was still worth \$35 million to our local community," Visit Omaha Executive Director Deborah Ward said in an interview with KMTV.

Even with backlash for the move, USA Swimming, which coordinates the Trials, says the move is to account for the growing interest in the sport and provide more fans with the opportunity to attend the trials, participate in clinics and get coaching or buy gear. USA Swimming Chief Commercial Officer Shana Ferguson says the move is to help spur more growth in the Olympic Swim Trials.

"Omaha was fantastic. The athletes loved it, the spectators loved it, the spectacle we were able to make was phenomenal. It was gorgeous on TV. It was a great, great place for us to be for four [Trials], but we want more people to be able to feel the excitement of Trials in person. If there's one chance every four years for us to put on a spectacle that's watched around the globe, we've got to make it as big as we can," Ferguson said.

Dwayne Haskins killed on highway

Dwayne Haskins, the quarterback for the Pittsburgh Steelers, died on April 9 after being hit by a dump truck.

According to ESPN, the 24-year-old football player was in South Florida training with other Steelers quarterbacks, running backs and wide receivers before he was killed.

Haskins was walking on a South Florida highway when he was struck by an oncoming truck.

Florida Highway Patrol spokesperson Lt. Indiana Miranda, in an emailed statement, said "he was attempting to cross the westbound lanes of Interstate 595 when there was oncoming traffic."

She did not say why he was on the highway near Fort Lauderdale at the time, but the accident caused the highway to be shut down for several hours.

Steelers coach Mike Tomlin is "devastated and

at a loss for words with the unfortunate passing of Dwayne Haskins."

Haskins was loved by Tomlin and the other team members, and the Steelers are mourning his loss.

"He quickly became part of our Steelers family upon his arrival in Pittsburgh and was one of our hardest workers, both on the field and in our community. Dwayne was a great teammate, but even more so a tremendous friend to so many. I am truly heartbroken," Tom-

lin said.

After a great season at Ohio State in 2018, where he was declared the 2018 Big Ten Offensive Player of the Year, Haskins was selected fifteenth overall by the Washington Commanders in the 2019 draft. He spent two seasons with Washington before signing to Pittsburgh before last season.

During his time with Washington, he played 16 games over two seasons and compiled a Total Quarterback Ranking (QBR) of 29.4 (the league

average during that time was 63.5). He threw 12 touchdown passes to 14 interceptions. Haskins started seven games in his rookie year and the first four games the next season but was benched after a 31-17 loss to the Baltimore Ravens. He was released by Washington later that season and went unclaimed on waivers until he signed a reserve contract with Pittsburgh in January 2021.

While Haskins was a devoted football player, he also made it his mission to better the communities he was in. In early March, he visited Fulton Elementary, a public school about five miles away from the

Steelers' practice facility, to celebrate Read Across America Day. It was reportedly a hit with the students as they were in awe that a real-life Steeler had come to read them a book. Haskins also volunteered to help hand out backpacks, school supplies and hygiene kits at a back-to-school event.

Additionally, he and eight teammates took a group of local kids shopping for winter gear at Dick's Sporting Goods as a part of the Salvation Army's Project Bundle Up and later delivered Christmas gifts, food, shoes, socks and health care items to Pittsburgh organizations and the Convoy of Hope for Hud-

dle for the Holidays. Despite Haskins being active for only a single game in Pittsburgh, his impact on the community will no doubt be felt for years to come.

Ohio State paid homage to its former quarterback by holding a moment of silence at Ohio Stadium before their game on April 16. Players and coaching staff wore "DH" decals or pins and Haskins' initials were placed on the field near the five-yard line. Current Buckeyes quarterback C.J. Stroud wore Haskins' No. 7 jersey as a personal tribute to honor the quarterback.

Despite the satire and comedy, there is also a deeper political message according to McKercher.

"This one has a bit of a deeper political message.

It's not just based on a tacky terrible movie, it's talking about America and its propensity for the vulgarity of propaganda. To be used by unsavory people to push political agendas," McKercher said.

They honed in on this message by the end of the musical by incorporating books from the current list of burned books in America. Burned books are those currently slated for elimination from circulation, including schools.

Therefore, there was hope that the audience would take away this political message of the dangers of propaganda.

Going into the show

was many weeks of harder work. In fact, the cast actually had one less week than they would normally have which meant the cast, crew and Music Director Boston Reid had to work even harder.

"We had huge turnouts, and the show was a great representation of how committed and talented the Doane Theatre Department is on and off stage. I will miss this show so much," Knorr said.

There were parts, especially in regard to the comedy, that McKercher as well as the cast worried about landing with the audience. The production also involved analyzing what to include and what

With the semester coming to a close real soon, I figured I would use this week's Hot Takes to help anyone struggling with whether or not the new Lego Star Wars game is worth it. Having completed the story for all nine movies, I feel like I've played enough of the game to have an objective opinion on it.

"Lego Star Wars The Skywalker Saga" feels like what "Avengers Endgame" is for the Marvel universe. While it's not the end-all be-all, it's something special that's been years in the making and was crafted with care and love for every tiny detail. It's a game that was made by Star Wars fans, for Star Wars fans and it shows. I'll discuss my favorite parts of the game first and then go into what I think could have been better or things that I personally was not overly fond of.

First of all, the gameplay is amazing. Gone are the days of just mindlessly pressing the attack button and running around like a chicken with its head cut off. Now, you can press different buttons in different orders to perform various combos which reward you with money. While you can still mash a single button, enemies can catch on to you and start blocking your attacks and even counter them and damage you.

Additionally, the boss fights are much more engaging now. Instead of bosses being like regular enemies but just with more health, the bosses in this new game take a more nuanced approach. You have to look and listen for visual and auditory clues

to know when they're going to perform attacks that are unblockable and must dodge them while still trying to damage the boss.

Especially for it being a completely new system of gameplay, it's very fluid and intuitive while still being challenging enough to be engaging. Overall, I rate the gameplay a 9/10.

Next is the characters and classes. Instead of there only being a few classes (jedi, sith, gun, droid, bounty hunter, etc.) and there only being one or two distinguishing things about each one (sith can use the force on some things, jedi can't *without a cheat code*, people with guns can attach to hooks and grapple onto things, droids can unlock certain doors and aren't targeted by enemies, bounty hunters have bombs that blow up silver objects, etc.), there are close to ten character classes that each have several unique abilities. I can't go into it in this because a proper explanation would exceed the word

count for the paper as a whole, but know that each class comes with its own set of unique abilities and each one comes in handy across the game. I rate the characters and character classes an 8.5/10.

The final aspect I want to touch on is the cutscenes and dialogue. It's perfect. While I do find the mumbling of the old Lego games very fun and charming and it will always hold a special place in my heart, so much of this game's humor comes from small quips and character interactions that I can't really imagine playing it without the voices.

While I was initially a little sad they didn't use voice clips from the movies or got the actors back, they got most of the voice actors from other Star Wars properties (games, tv shows, movies, etc.) to voice the characters which, to me, fits the game better than the actual voice actors would. The cutscenes are also pure crackhead energy absurd-

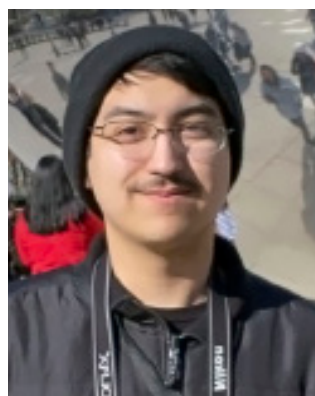
ist humor and I am all here for it. Overall, I rate the cutscenes and dialogue a 9.5/10.

With the end of the semester quickly approaching, I'm finally able to start thinking about what we'll be doing over the summer.

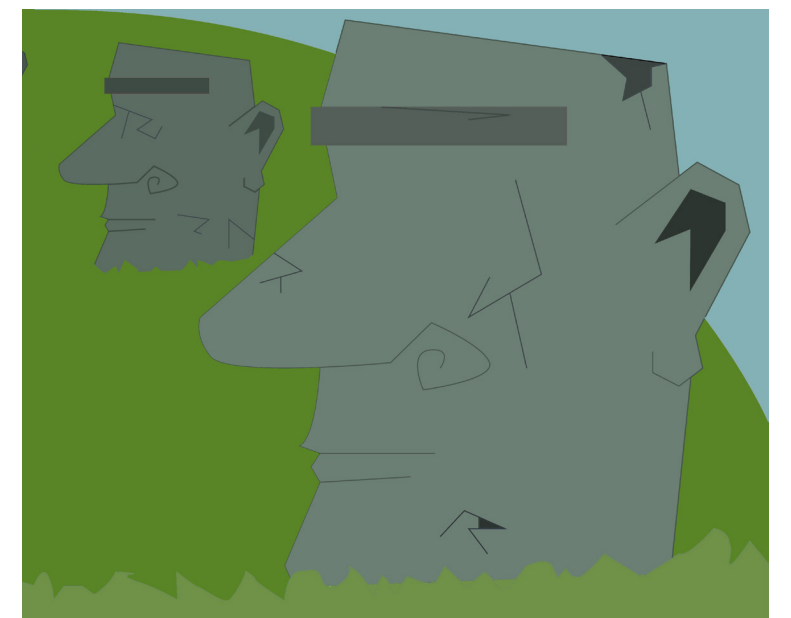
As it stands right now, my parents decided to change up what we usually do for this year. Instead of needing to choose between California and Mexico for our vacation and to visit some family, I

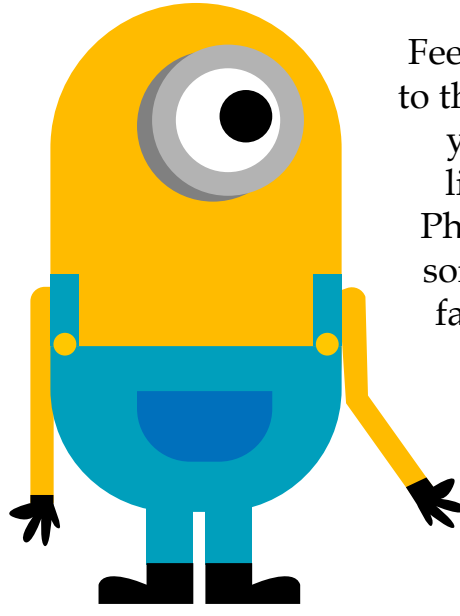
pening, we act as if we expected it rather than be grateful.

Over the long weekend, there were many ups for Doane's Baseball team and many downs for their Softball team. While the Baseball team grabbed a few wins and saw multiple individual achievements, the Softball team picked up a couple more losses on their home field.

To kick off their weekend, Baseball headed to Seward, Neb. on Friday to face Concordia University in a doubleheader. Concordia started up in the first game during the fourth inning with an RBI hit in off senior Jordan Wisner.

Doane put up a fight in the sixth inning and tied up the game 1-1 after a wild pitch allowed sophomore Justin Nevells across home. The Tigers kept up the heat and scored again in the seventh, when junior Nate Mensik crossed home off another wild pitch from the Bulldogs and gave them their first win 2-1.

Later that day, Doane was dominant in their second game, scoring nine runs on Concordia

throughout seven full innings. Concordia finally picked up two runs in the bottom of the eighth and bottom of the ninth, capping off Doane's clean sweep of the day.

Doane's second day of a doubleheader was not as successful but still improved their record. They returned back to Crete and went against Morningside University, splitting the day overall.

During the first game, the Mustangs snagged an early lead in the first two innings, 2-0. However, senior Joe Osborn hit his record breaking home run in the third inning and made the score 2-2. Osborn broke Doane's standing single-season record when he hit his 17th homerun this sea-

son.

Later that same inning, senior Lukas White picked up his own run, allowing Doane to head into the fourth up 3-2. Although Morningside came back for a short lived period in the top of the fourth, Doane showed out and maintained a 7-3 lead until the sixth inning.

Morningside finally proved too much for Doane and was able to pick up five runs off the Tigers, finishing out the first game defeating them 7-8. However, Doane did not stay down for long and would bring themselves back in the second game.

This game started similarly with the Mustangs up 2-0 and the Tigers

tying it not long after. Doane pulled ahead in the seventh inning and would hold out to defeat Morningside 5-2.

This now gives Doane's Baseball team a record of 29-8 overall, 18-2 in conference games and ranked first overall. During these games, senior Travis Cowan had a big personal achievement of his own when he picked up his 200th career strikeout, adding just another accomplishment to Doane's Baseball season.

Softball picked up two losses at home on Friday and Saturday against Morningside University. On senior night, before recognizing Alicia Vint, Haley Kennedy and Shelby Downard, Doane

fell to the Mustangs 2-0.

The second game saw the Mustangs continue their victories with another 2-1 win and made their sweep of the day. The Tigers are now 8-23 on the season with only eight games left to improve their record.

Their next games will be this weekend on April 22 and 23 in doubleheaders against the University of Jamestown and Dakota Wesleyan University. The Softball team will be on the road for both. Doane's Baseball team will continue their season on April 23 and 24, first at home and then on the road, against Hastings College.

The first automatic qualifying mark went to junior Allison Skala in the shot put with a distance of 14.44m. Skala would go on to earn provisional qualifying marks in the discus (42.64m) and in the javelin (40.21m).

Sophomore Macy Fuller picked up the second automatic qualifying mark in the hammer throw with 50.64m.

The Men amassed eight NAIA qualifying marks.

Senior Mason Krause

won big in the javelin with a throw of 58.84m, earning him an automatic qualifying mark and a spot in Doane's Top 10 charts. His throw was the eighth-best in Doane's history and took the spot of 1937's Don Kristufek.

Senior Matthew Campbell earned a provisional mark in the shot put (15.74m) and an automatic mark in the hammer throw (56.70m). Campbell won both events with his marks.

Sophomore Luke Partridge hit a provisional mark in the hammer throw with a distance of 55.99m, earning him second place in the event.

Sophomore Zach Turner earned a provisional mark in the 110m hurdles with a time of 14.66, which would also win him the event. Turner went on to claim an automatic mark in the 400m hurdles with a time of 52.03.

Senior Logan Hammond brought home a provisional mark in the 400m hurdles with 53.78.

The 4x100m relay team hit the provisional standard with a time of 41.86. The team includes freshman JaDae Moore, Turner, sophomore Andrew Mahoney and freshman Luke Davis.
