

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

sprint.

Gorillas have opposable thumbs, faster and more efficient climbing skills, maneuvering abilities such as jumping and are more likely to use projectiles.

I'm going to assume neither animal lands a determining blow straight away, and that they are both able to analyze the situation. Let's not forget both of these animals can take a much heavier beating than a human.

Both have an insane bite, but for a gorilla, it would be much riskier. A grizzly has fat, bones, skin, muscle and fur, which can sustain a bite. 
