

Chinese balloon shot down over U.S.

On Feb. 4, the United States Department of Defense reported having sent a jet to shoot down an alleged Chinese high-altitude surveillance balloon off the east coast.

Initially ordered on Feb. 1, President Joe Biden called for the destruction of the balloon after the U.S. first detected the balloon on Jan. 28 when it entered U.S. airspace near the Aleutian Islands.

The balloon ended up traversing from Alaska, through Canada and eventually re-entered the U.S. over Idaho. The Department of Defense waited until Feb. 4, after six miles off the coast of South Carolina, in order to ensure the safety of U.S. citizens in case it






